The goal of a Burma Shave Campaign is to increase awareness among motorists about safe driving speeds in your community. Volunteers stand along the edge of a "problem" road, and hold up a series of signs with clever safety-oriented phrases and wave at passing drivers.

Burma Shave signs are modeled after the originals from decades ago, and continue their message of safe driving.

We have created multiple catchy messages that you can deploy in your community.

Volunteers hold up signs with the Burma Shave messages and wave to passing cars to remind them to drive carefully in your community.

This outreach and education effort is very quick and easy to deploy.



THINGS YOU NEED

Materials:

- Coroplast (Corrogated Plastic)
- Large Cardboard Boxes
- Paint (White And Black)
- Fat Permanent Markers
- Phrases:
 - Drive Slow / And See The Town / Drive Fast / And See Blue Lights
 - Drive As If / Every Child / On The Street / Were Your Own
 - Give Respect / Get Respect / Safety Is A / Two-Way Street
 - Drive / Twenty-Five [OR YOUR COMMUNITY'S POSTED LIMIT] / Keep Kids / ALIVE

MAKING IT HAPPEN

One Month Ahead

- Start recruiting volunteers to hold the signs
- Purchase coroplast
- Make signs and paint box (you can get volunteers to help with this, too)

Two Weeks Ahead:

• Send out a reminder to volunteers about the event

One Week Ahead:

• Confirm with volunteers

One-Two Days Ahead:

- Pull Burma Shave signs out from storage
- Send out reminders to volunteers

MAXIMIZING YOUR IMPACT

- Make sure your volunteers are enthusiastic and energetic wavers!
- Make sure you have a high-traffic location that has a history of trouble with car traffic.
- Involve a few children (increases the engagement factor).
- Hand-drawn signs are preferred, to keep that grass-roots feel of the outreach.
- Have one child wear a box painted with your community's speed limit as an additional impactful reminder to drivers.
